Supporting Third-Party Educational Conferences	Companies that wish to provide support educational grants/donations should:  Ensure conferences are primarily dedicated to promoting objective scientific and educational activities and discourse; support is for a genuine, independent educational function; and expenses associated with bona fide educational activities.  Not participate in or attempt to influence the selection of individual HCPs that benefit.  Not provide as a quid pro quo or with the intention to influence the recipient's decision to purchase, order, recommend, or market any product or Medical Technology, nor condition a grant/donation on a requirement to purchase, order, recommend, or market any product or medical technology; and  Document appropriately.  Companies that wish to provide conference meals and refreshments should ensure they are provided to all HCP attendees in a manner that is consistent with applicable standards established by the conference organizer and the body accrediting the educational activity. Third Party Sales and Marketing Intermediaries (Third Party SMIs)	Companies should adopt a specific compliance program for Third Party SMI relationships that applies to everyone, including Company's senior leadership.  Identifies seven elements to include in a compliance program for Third Party SMI relationships: Includes these elements:  • Written Policy/Procedure;  • Risk Assessment;  • Due Diligence Program;  • Written Contract;  • Training and Education;  • Monitor/Audit; and  • Appropriate Corrective Action.  Companies should require Third Party SMIs with which they have a direct contractual relationship and control over the terms of the contract to comply with Company policies that implement the Code.
